M., a man, 30 years old, a former prisoner who is HIV +. M. has a tattoo on his fingers that says "ZENIT" (football club). M is fluent in Russian, but one can notice that, most likely, M. is from one of the Central Asian countries. He lives in St. Petersburg though. You are working in St. Petersburg, too. His CD4 count is 275 cells/mm³, the viral load - above 100,000 copies/ml. M. was serving a sentence in a prison in Central Asia, says that he has never used drugs, but regularly drank chifir (highly concentrated tea) with friends.
